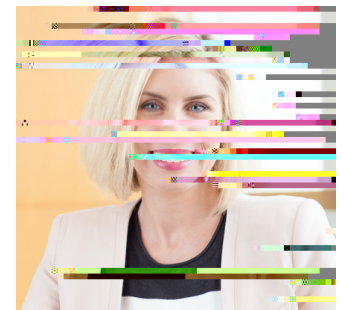
## “Sex and Gender in Political Behaviour Research”

Eliabe Hagedorn-Gan (Ph.D. McGill) is an Associate Professor in the Department of Political Science at Queen's University, and the Director of the Queen's Institute for International Relations (IIGR) and the Canadian Online Research Archive (CORA). Her research focuses on Canadian and comparative politics, international politics, voting behaviour, and public opinion; news media; and the political experience of women. She is the author of *Gendered News: Media Coverage and Electoral Politics in Canada*, which won the 2016 Pierre-Saunders Award from the International Council of Canadian Studies, and a recent book published in the Canadian Political Science Association's 2014 Donald Smiley Prize.
