

Get to know University Councillor Jeremy Gooden, Sc'16:

1. What is your most memorable moment as a student?

I met my wife in first year at Queen's and it's tough to narrow down a single moment of us together. Breakfasts at Ban Righ, studying together, watching her walk across the stage for convocation...many to count!

2. What is your current career?

I'm a Director at Altas Partners, a Toronto-based private equity firm, in the Portfolio Solutions Group where I work with the executives of our portfolio companies to drive performance and profitability. 3. What is the best career advice you've ever received?
